State House Approves Department of Transportation Overhaul And Budget

The State House approved bipartisan financial reforms and an overhaul of the State Board of Transportation on Wednesday after a State Auditor's report found the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) exceeded its annual budget by \$742 million in 2019.

House Bill 77 addresses concerns raised by State Auditor Beth Wood to increase taxpayer accountability at NCDOT with stronger transparency measures, firm management oversight, and a restructured board with legislative appointees. It also directs annual NCDOT audits by the State Auditor.

The legislation balances the department's budget, modifies cash balance thresholds, and sets a temporary new floor for North Carolina's gas tax.

Under H.B. 77, the new State Board of Transportation will have 20 members, 14 division members appointed by the Governor, and six at-large members appointed by legislative leaders.
