The Obama campaign has produced an ad that says the president was taken out of context when he told a group of supporters, "If you've got a business — you didn't build that. Somebody else made that happen."

Republicans says Mr. Obama was dissing the private sector. Democrats say the president meant that the private and public sectors work hand in hand.
